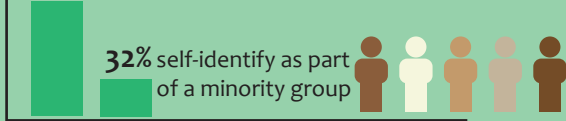


COVID-19 Survey of Primary Care Clinicians and Patients

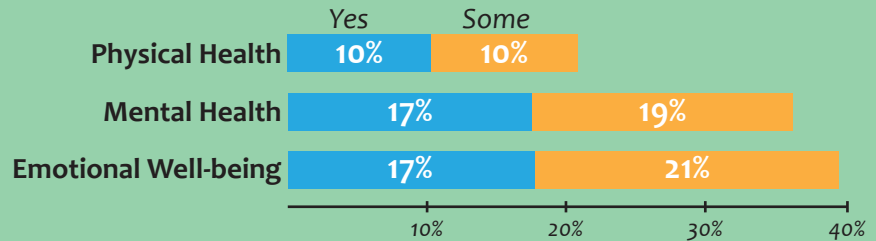
Topic: Racism, Care Relationships, and Practice Strain

Racism affects health:

86% of all patients who responded believe racism affects health



Patients believe racism has affected their...



46% of clinicians say that George Floyd's death and similar events have impacted the concerns their patients present

49% say these events have impacted their minority patients in particular

Primary care practices feel the effects of racism on their patients' health and well-being.

Patients have meaningful relationships with primary care:



Patients are raising concerns about racism with their providers; nearly half (**46%**) of clinicians say that George Floyd's death and similar events have been part of their conversations with patients.

Patients say:

23% The impact of racism is something a primary care doctor can help with.

76% I can ask my doctor about anything, medical or not.

79% Seeing my doctor just makes me feel better.



Primary care continues to be a place where patients come to discuss and make sense of external events.

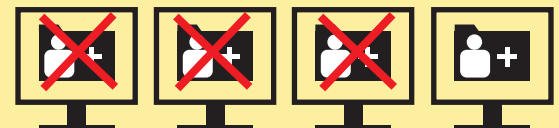

The strain on primary care practices remains:



Stress Level

Nearly **2 of 3 (63%)** of practices report stress is at an all time high



3 in 4 clinicians say their EHR doesn't adequately document or bill for the work they are doing

46% of clinicians say that George Floyd's death has impacted their wellbeing and that of their colleagues.



49% of clinicians still lack PPE

Primary care continues to function under tremendous strain and is in need of support from policy makers.
