An Evolution of the Family-Centered Medical Home

UNIQUE NEEDS OF CHILDREN

Unlike adults, children depend on their family as the primary support in their life. Family and caregivers are their constants. Children are different than adults in the following ways.



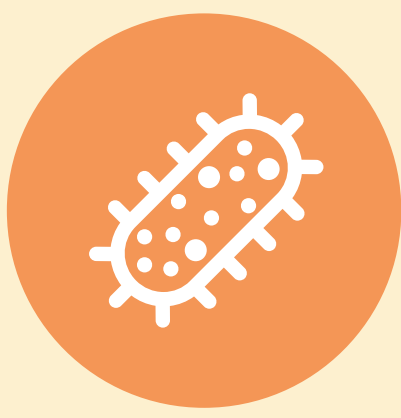
DEVELOPMENTAL CHANGE

Care enhances a child's development and is habilitative, not rehabilitative.



DEPENDENCY

Children depend on their family and other adults in their community.



DIFFERENTIAL EPIDEMIOLOGY

Children are healthy, for the most part. Primary prevention is the main focus.



DEMOGRAPHY

Children experience disproportionate rates of poverty. They are more racially and ethnically diverse than adults.



HEALTHCARE DOLLARS

Overall costs related to child health are small. Return on investment is experienced over the long-term.

When children experience excessive stress and for long periods of time, learning, behavior and health across the lifespan may suffer.

RISING.↑

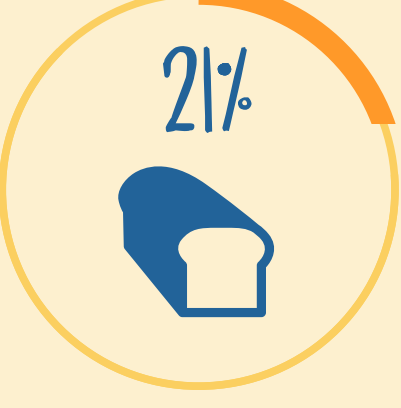
27% of children are living with a chronic health condition.



45% of U.S. children live in a low-income household



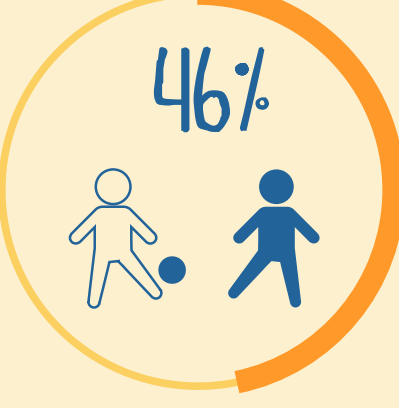
25% of all U.S. children are of Hispanic origin

40% of children in the U.S. who needed mental health treatment did not receive it



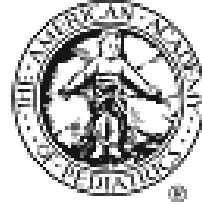
46% of children in the U.S. have experienced at least one adverse childhood experience (ACE)
